I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit. . . . Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in me. I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing. Who Determines Your Giving?

*I*n the light of Bible teaching, let me ask you pointedly, "Who determines the proportion and the amount of your giving?" In order to answer this, one must first of all ask, "Who determines your receiving?"

Perhaps some would answer, "I determine my receiving, for I work for a stated salary which I honorably earn." But God says, "But thou shalt remember the Lord thy God, for it is He that giveth thee power to get wealth" (Deuteronomy 8:18).

If, as God says, he determines our receiving, giving us the power, the wisdom, the strength to earn our livelihood, even furnishing us the very air we breathe, only he has the right to determine what we shall give. And the only clear, unmistakable, simple plan he offers is the tithe as the minimum.

In the last book of the Old Testament, in the book that spanned 400 barren years when no prophet's voice was heard, until John the Baptist and Jesus came forth, it is significant that God would inspire this message and preserve it for all the days of man: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse!"
